Bible Reading Plan - 2026 Part 1

Introduction

This Reading Plan will be different from other Reading Plans. First, we won't finish the Bible in one year; it will take us a few years, and that's okay because the goal of this plan and the goal of reading the Bible at all is to learn about God. This reading is designed to stretch you by requiring less reading but providing more understanding. Each week, you will be given one passage to read. But each day, we will ask you to read it differently. The weekly format will stay the same, but the Scripture will change week to week. How did we decide what Scripture to read? Great question! Here at Brushy Creek, each small group (Sunday School) birth through Senior Adults follows the same curriculum. We've structured this plan to follow that curriculum. Each week, from Monday to Friday, you will read the passage your class will be studying for the upcoming Sunday.

So what is this weekly format? Wow, another great question! Each week, you will be given a passage, for example, Week 1 is Genesis 1. On Mondays, Day 1, read Genesis 1 and, if time allows, reread it in a different translation. For example, I'll read Genesis 1 in my daily Bible, which is an ESV. And then I'll reread it in The Message Bible, which is a paraphrased translation of the Bible, or from one of my sons' children's Bibles; our favorite is The Greatest Storybook Bible. And that's it, day one is done.

Day 2, Tuesdays, you're going to pick up a pen or pencil and maybe even a notebook or a Journaling Bible. Read Genesis 1 and mark it up by underlining repetitive words, identifying themes, lists, comparisons, and contrasts, as well as conjunctions (such as "and," "but," and "for"), cause-and-effect relationships, and other key elements. This can be as detailed as you want. For some of us, this will be easy, maybe even fun. For the rest of us, this will be a stretch. Perhaps a resource like "Grasping God's Word" or "Women of the Word" could be helpful. But trust us, it will be worth it! The goal of the day is to understand that these words connect and are purposeful; they hold great meaning! They hold the truths about who God is!

Day 3, Wednesdays, read that week's passage alongside the green and blue Questions as you study the Bible bookmark. My favorite question is "What does this passage teach us about God?" You can use the "Attributes of God" resource to help. When I read Genesis 1, I am reminded that God is Infinite. God has no limits in this person or on His power.

Day 4, Thursdays, read that week's passage with a creed or doctrine in mind. We will provide a specific doctrine each week for you to think

upon. These will include catechism questions and answers, important term definitions, or thoughts important to the grand story of the Bible. For example, "What is sin?" or "What does YAHWEH mean?" To quote, Kevin Deyoung from his book Daily Doctrine, "the overarching goal in all this learning [of doctrine] is to understand what the Bible teaches, defend what the Bible teaches, and enjoy the God whom the Bible reveals."

Day 5, Fridays, read that week's scripture and pray through it. By now, you've done some heavy lifting through this passage and hopefully have a deeper understanding of the passage. Perhaps as you pray, take a moment to reflect on the Attributes of God and thank Him for being the Creator. Maybe as you read, someone or a need comes to mind. Maybe there is a confession needed. Ask the Lord to give you an opportunity to tell someone about what you have learned about Him this week. And now you have completed the weekly reading plan, but wait, here's a bonus: on Sunday you will have the opportunity to come together in your groups and talk about everything you have learned, ask questions about things that were confusing, and celebrate the God that you now know in a deeper way. Bible study writer Jen Wilkin often says, "The heart cannot love what the mind does not know." Our prayer through this reading plan is that you will begin to know God in a fuller, more intimate way, and in turn, your love for Him will continue to grow.

It is possibly where Abraham sacrificed in Genesis 18. It was a Canaanite royal city (Joshua 8:7-9) and was eventually alloted to the tribe of Benjamin (Joshua 18:22). The ark of the covenant was located at Bethel (Judges 20) and was on Samuel's circuit when he judged Israel (1 Samuel 10:3). Bethel is associated with both sanctuary and deity. 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Week 21 (5/18) Genesis 32-35 God Almighty - El Shaddia - Shadah can refer to sufficiency to provide, however, this particular name of God is from the root word shadad which refers to power. Being, almighty, God has the power to provide, the power to protect, and the power to chasten or destroy in judgment. Week 22 (5/25) Genesis 36-38 While the parallels of between Joseph and Jesus are not developed explicitly in the NT, the Christian church traditionally recognizes key parallels between their lives. Joseph was loved by his father (Genesis 37:3; Mark 1:11), sent to his brothers who denied him and sold him for silver (Genesis 37:28; John 7:5; Matthew 26:15), suffered persecution and temptation (Genesis 37:18-36; 39:7-20; Matthew 4:1-11), and was ultimately exalted as lord over his brothers (Genesis 42:6; Philippians 2:9-10). This divine, constant, even stubborn love does what no other love can do and provide what no one else can see. Matthew Henry, "God can raise up friends for his people even where they little expect to find them." Joseph makes friends in prison! 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Week 24 (6/8) Genesis 40-41 Special Revelation - God reveals Himself directly and in greater detail. God speaks directly to Adam and Eve (Genesis 2-3), audiibly at Sinai (Deuteronomy 5), and by powerful signs and wonders (Deuteronomy 34), and vocal confirmation (Mathew 3:17). He revealed Himself thorough dreams and visions in Isaiah 6, Daniel 9, and Revelation 1. Every case of such revelations in the Bible has to do with the person's place in the outworking of God's saving purposes. There are no instances in which God gives special guidance to the ordinary believing Israelite or Christian in the details of their person existence.
