Scripture: Acts 4:32-5:11

LEVELS OF BIBLICAL LEARNING

PRESCHOOL:

- God helps people.
- God is always with people.

YOUNGER KIDS (K5-2ND GRADE):

- God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit are the Trinity.
- The Holy Spirit helps Christians tell others about Jesus and God's plan.
- The Holy Spirit urges people to receive God's salvation.

OLDER KIDS (3RD-5TH GRADE):

- The Holy Spirit is given to a person when he trusts Jesus as his Savior and Lord.
- The Holy Spirit empowers Christians to tell others about Jesus and God's plan of salvation.
- God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit are the Trinity. The Trinity is eternal, holy and perfect.



MEMORY VERSE

And Peter said to them, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. For the promise is for you and for your children and for all who are far off, everyone whom the Lord our God calls to himself." - Acts 2:38-39

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BUSY BIN

As the kids arrive, they will pick up a snack and drink from the entry table. Each classroom will have a basket of blocks or building materials for the kids to play with as their friends arrive.

INTRODUCTORY ACTIVITY

Play Act the Part: Invite one kid at a time to act out a part, such as a doctor mending a broken bone, an astronaut walking on the moon, or a ballerina on the stage. While the kid is acting out the part, lead the group to guess who he or she is and what they are doing. Allow all kids an opportunity to act out a part of someone with a specific job description while the group guesses.

Say: In this activity, you acted out a part, but none of you are actually the people you pretended to be. Sometimes people try to act a certain way to make others believe that's who they really are, but God knows their true heart and who they are when no one is watching. Today, we will learn how two people in our Bible story pretended to be generous, but weren't.

Our story today teaches us about the generosity of the early church. They recognized how generous God is and how much they had been given in Jesus. They trusted God and desired to be generous like Him. Yet, not everyone was as generous as they seemed. As we read, we'll learn that God knows our hearts and see how Peter confronted sin.

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BACKGROUND INFO FOR LEADERS

The early church, empowered by the Holy Spirit, demonstrated remarkable courage in proclaiming Jesus' identity and performing miracles to validate their message. But beyond bold testimony and supernatural signs, the Spirit also produced a deep unity and love among believers, which led to generous, voluntary sharing of resources, compelled by love, not law.

Acts 4:32–35 highlights how this Spirit-inspired generosity ensured “there were no needy persons among them” (Acts 4:34). Believers laid their resources at the apostles' feet, entrusting them to distribute aid where it was most needed. This practice reflected the commands of Deuteronomy 15 and honored God, as hearts were transformed to give joyfully and sacrificially. A shining example was Barnabas, who sold a field and gave the proceeds to the apostles to help those in need (Acts 4:36–37).

However, amid this unity, the tragic story of Ananias and Sapphira in Acts 5:1–11 provides a stark contrast. They, too, sold property, but deceitfully kept back part of the money while pretending to donate the full amount. The Greek word for “kept back” (*enosphisato*) implies embezzlement and is the same term used in Joshua 7:1 when Achan took forbidden spoils, bringing judgment on all Israel. Similarly, the couple's deceit threatened the integrity and unity of the early church. Though Ananias appeared to lie to the apostles, Peter revealed he had lied to the Holy Spirit (Acts 5:3), and ultimately to God (Acts 5:4). Rather than being influenced by the Spirit, Ananias was filled with Satan, giving the enemy a foothold through his greed.

Their sin was not merely about withholding money but hypocrisy—pretending to be Spirit-led while secretly serving self-interest. When confronted, Ananias collapsed and died, a divine judgment (Acts 5:5). Sapphira, unaware of what had happened, repeated the lie and also died at Peter's feet (Acts 5:10). As a result, great fear—a reverent awe—came over the whole church (Acts 5:11). Notably, this is the first time Luke uses the term “church” in Acts, underscoring the gravity of sin within the body of Christ.

This episode serves as a sobering warning. God desires His people to serve Him in truth and integrity, and failure to do so can disrupt the harmony and mission of the church

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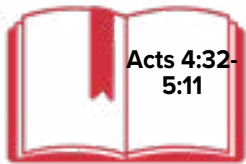


(Eph. 4:25–28). The same power that blessed the church with unity and miracles (Acts 4:32; 5:12–16) also brought judgment against deception and disunity. The Holy Spirit exposed the couple’s treachery, ensuring the church remained pure and on mission.

While others surrendered to the Spirit’s leading, Ananias and Sapphira let the desires of the flesh override the good works God had prepared for them. Their actions grieved the Spirit by masking false motives with a facade of devotion—a danger still relevant to the church today. Yet even in this sobering account, we are reminded of the transforming love of Christ. Though greed ensnared this couple, we are called to live in obedience to the Spirit, allowing His power and Christ’s sacrificial example to shape us into a generous, unified, and truthful community, fully committed to God’s mission.



LOCATE THE SCRIPTURE & TELL THE STORY



Remind your group that we are studying the New Testament. The book of Acts is about God sending the Holy Spirit to permanently dwell within Jesus' disciples and other believers after He ascended back to heaven. With the help of the Holy Spirit, those who followed Christ told many people about Jesus, helped others, and started the first churches. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, the message of Jesus began to spread all over the world.

TELL
THE
STORY



Tell the story: After Jesus ascended into heaven, his disciples were filled with the Holy Spirit and were given power to be Jesus' witnesses. Thousands of people believed in Jesus, and the church began. Peter played an important role in the early church, following the example Jesus had set. Like Jesus, Peter preached the gospel and healed people, all so that others might come to know Christ too. Today, we will learn how Peter confronted sin within the church.

Read directly from Scripture, use The Jesus Storybook Bible, The Biggest Story Bible, or the summary provided in the lesson

The early church was growing. By the power of the Holy Spirit, the apostles were telling people that Jesus had been raised from the dead. A large group of believers met together in Jerusalem. They shared everything they had. If someone had more than he needed, he gladly gave it away so everyone had what they needed.

One man, Barnabas, sold a field and gave the money to the apostles. The apostles used the money to help people in need. Everyone who had land or houses did the same. Ananias and his wife, Sapphira, sold some land and pretended to give all the money to the apostles, but they kept some of it for themselves.



Put the events in order, draw a comic strip, build it with blocks or playdough, act it out, etc...

When Ananias brought the money to the apostles, Peter asked him, "Why are you lying to the Holy Spirit? You could have been honest about what you did with the money, but instead you lied- not to us, but to God." When Ananias heard this, he fell down, died, and was buried. Everyone who heard this was filled with fear.

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About three hours later, Sapphira came to the apostles. She did not know what had happened to her husband. Peter asked her, “Is this all the money you got for the land?”

“Yes,” she said, “That’s all of it.”

Peter said, “Why did you and your husband agree to test the Lord?” Then Sapphira fell dead too. Great fear came on everyone in the church and all who heard about these things.

God wants us to be generous to others. God displayed His generosity toward us when He sent His Son, Jesus, to take the payment for our sins. Today, we will learn how the early church showed generosity.

Re-tell the Bible Story: put events in order, draw a comic strip, build it with blocks or playdough, act it out, etc.

Share the GOSPEL: Ananias and Sapphira wanted to look generous but were greedy and chose to lie. The Holy Spirit changes our hearts so that we want to share with those in need. Jesus generously gave all He had so we can share in His riches and have forgiveness and eternal life.

We can’t hide our sins from God. He knows our hearts and thoughts, but God is generous and has made the way for our sins to be forgiven. Sharing the good news of Jesus lets everyone know how we can freely come to Him to find forgiveness and new life.

As followers of Jesus, we show our trust, thankfulness, and love toward God when we live generously. Being greedy reveals a heart that is self-focused and unbelieving toward God. God mercifully gave us the Holy Spirit, who transforms our hearts so we can show generosity toward others and be a witness for Jesus’ incredible generosity toward us.

The Holy Spirit empowered the apostles to share the good news. As a result, people came to trust Jesus as their Savior, and the church began to grow. They not only grew in number, but in love for one another. The Holy Spirit transformed their hearts to desire to show love through generosity. They gave so that every believer had what they needed. The church grew and displayed Jesus’ generosity because of the Holy Spirit. The same is true for us. Our spiritual growth and good works are due to the Lord working in and through our lives.



QUESTIONS TO REBUILD THE STORY

Many were coming to faith in Jesus, and the early church was growing in number. How was the work of the Holy Spirit seen in the early church? How did the people care for each other? (Acts 4:1, 34) People gave and shared with one another, supporting each other as brothers and sisters in Christ. The Holy Spirit transformed the people's hearts and lives. The early church became known for how they shared and gave generously when others had a need. People even began to sell their land and houses to give money to the apostles to distribute to the poor. Some, however, wanted to appear generous but were greedy.

Ananias and Sapphira sold their land, but instead of giving all the profit to the apostles, they kept some for themselves. They lied and told the apostles they had given all the profits, pretending to be generous. Who did Peter say Ananias was lying to? (Acts 4:5). When Ananias and Sapphira lied about the money they gave, they lied to the Lord. When we sin, we not only hurt others, but we also sin against the Lord. The story of Ananias and Sapphira reminds us how serious sin is to the Lord and how we need the Holy Spirit to transform our hearts so we can live in a way that honors God.

Why is the gospel good news? The gospel is good news because Jesus' life, death and resurrection is the only way for us to be saved from sin. When we are saved, the Holy Spirit dwells in us to change us so that our hearts love God more than we love our sin.

Do we work for or earn our salvation? Why not? How is salvation an act of generosity toward us? God has freely given us the gift of salvation, which we can't earn. God gave His only perfect Son, Jesus, so that we could be saved. God provides help and comfort to believers through the Holy Spirit.

Jesus has been generous to us. How can we show generosity to others?

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How does giving to others show the love of Jesus? The Holy Spirit grows the fruit of generosity in our hearts so that we desire to love others through giving. Generosity is evidence of a heart transformed by grace.

Why is honesty important in the life of a believer? Honesty is important as we try to point others to Jesus and live as a witness for Him. Believers should strive to honor God in every aspect of their lives. God knows our hearts, and we cannot fool Him. Being honest shows others what Jesus is like.

What does this story teach me about God or the gospel?

What does the story teach me about myself?

Are there any commands in this story to obey? How are they for God's glory and my good?

Are there any promises in this story to remember? How do they help me trust and love God?

How does this story help me live on mission?

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PRAYER PROMPTS

Thank You, Lord, for the gift of salvation. Thank You for sending Your Son, Jesus so that we can have forgiveness and eternal life. Help us live to please You in everything we do. In Jesus' name, amen.

IF TIME ALLOWS:

Practice naming the 4 Gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. Remind the kids that these books are in the NT and tell of Jesus' time on earth. Practice finding these books in the Bible.

Practice naming some of the disciples. During Wednesday night Bible study childcare, the kids learned a hokey song to remember all of the disciples. Play it a couple of times with your group and have them try to sing along.

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ATTRIBUTES OF GOD

ATTENTIVE - God hears and responds to the needs of his children.

COMPASSIONATE - God cares for his children and acts on their behalf.

CREATOR - God made everything. He is uncreated.

DELIVERER - God rescues and saves his children.

ETERNAL - God is not limited by time. He exists outside of time.

FAITHFUL - God always keeps his promises.

GENEROUS - God gives what is best and beyond what is deserved.

GLORIOUS - God displays His greatness and worth.

GOOD - God is what is best and gives what is best. He is incapable of doing harm.

HOLY - God is perfect, pure, and without sin.

IMMUTABLE/UNCHANGING - God never changes. He is the same yesterday, today, and tomorrow.

INCOMPREHENSIBLE - God is beyond our understanding. We can comprehend Him in part but not in whole.

INFINITE - God has not limits in His person or on His power.

JEALOUS - God will not share his glory with another. all glory rightfully belongs to him.

JUST - god is fair in all his actions and judgements. He cannot over-punish or under-punish.

LOVING - God feels and displays infinite, unconditional affection toward his children. His love for them does not depend on their worth, response, or merit.

MERCIFUL - God does not give his children the punishment they deserve.

OMNIPOTENT/ALMIGHTY - God holds all power. nothing is too hard for God. What He wills He can accomplish.

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ATTRIBUTES OF GOD

OMNIPRESENT - God is fully present everywhere.

OMNISCIENT - God knows everything, past, present, and future - all potential and real outcomes, all things micro and macro.

PATIENT/LONG-SUFFERING - God is untiring and bears with His children.

PROVIDER - God meets the needs of his children.

REFUGE - God is a place of safety and protection for his children.

RIGHTEOUS - God is always good and right.

SELF-EXISTENT - God depends on nothing and no one to give him life or existence.

SELF-SUFFICIENT - God is not vulnerable. He has no needs.

SOVEREIGN - God does everything according to His plan and pleasure.

TRANSCENDENT - God is not like humans. He is infinitely higher in being and action.

TRUTHFUL - Whatever God speaks or does is truth and reality.

WISE - God knows what is best and acts accordingly. He cannot choose wrongly.

WORTHY - God deserves all glory and honor and praise.

WRATHFUL - God hates all unrighteousness.
