Scripture: Hebrews

LEVELS OF BIBLICAL LEARNING

PRESCHOOL:

- People who love God tell others all over the world about Him.
- People can pray for others in their communities and world.

YOUNGER KIDS (K5-2ND GRADE):

- All Christians are called to be on mission with God.
- God works through people to do work in their communities and world.

BUSY BIN

As the kids come in they will choose a snack and drink from the table. Each child will also get a “Jesus is Better” sheet to color as their friends arrive. Once everyone is there, brainstorm things that Jesus is better than. Have the kids record some of these on their coloring sheet.

INTRODUCTORY ACTIVITY

Have the group sit in a circle on the floor. Play a quick game of “Which one is Better?” Give the kids two options and have them all choose which one is better by standing/sitting, closing eyes/opening eyes, moving to one side of the room or the other, etc. Keep it light and fun and do several quick rounds.

Say: We just picked which things we thought were better. The book of Hebrews tells us that Jesus is better than anything or anyone else- better than angels, better than priests, better than all the old sacrifices. He is the One who saves us and helps us know God forever!

BACKGROUND INFO FOR LEADERS

The book of Hebrews reminds us that Jesus is faithful and forever, the One who never changes, never fails, and never stops interceding for His people (*Hebrews 4:14–16; 7:25*). Though we don't know exactly who wrote this letter, we know the message came from God through someone deeply familiar with the Old Testament and completely convinced that Jesus is the promised Messiah. This letter was written to Jewish believers who were facing hardship and persecution for following Christ (*Hebrews 10:32–34*). They were weary, uncertain, and tempted to return to the safety of old traditions in Judaism. The writer urged them to keep their eyes on Jesus—the One who is worth following no matter the cost (*Hebrews 12:1–3*).

The author wanted them to remember that Jesus is better than anything or anyone else. He is a better messenger than the angels (*Hebrews 1:4*), because He doesn't just bring a message from God—He is God's final word (*Hebrews 1:1–2*). He is a better leader than Moses (*Hebrews 3:1–6*), because He didn't just guide God's people out of slavery in Egypt; He delivers His people from the slavery of sin (*Hebrews 2:14–15*). He is a better priest than any who came before Him, because He offered Himself as the perfect sacrifice once for all (*Hebrews 9:11–12; 10:10–12*). No more animal sacrifices were needed, because Jesus, the sinless Son of God, took our punishment and paid the price in full (*Hebrews 9:26–28*). Now He lives forever as our Mediator, standing before the Father on our behalf, praying for us, and inviting us to draw near with confidence to God's throne of grace (*Hebrews 4:14–16; 7:25*).

The message of Hebrews is that Jesus is better—He is the fulfillment of everything the Old Testament promised and pointed toward (*Hebrews 8:6; 10:1*). Every covenant, priest, and sacrifice was a shadow of what was coming in Christ (*Hebrews 9:23–24*). Because Jesus is faithful, we can trust Him completely (*Hebrews 10:23*). Because He is forever, His salvation will never end (*Hebrews 7:24–25; 13:8*). When the believers in Hebrews felt afraid and uncertain, the author reminded them that Jesus had not changed. He was still on His throne (*Hebrews 1:3*), still faithful to His promises (*Hebrews 10:36*), and still worth following even in suffering (*Hebrews 12:1–3*).

In a world full of shifting ideas and temporary hopes, Hebrews invites us to stand firm in the gospel truth that never fades: Jesus is the same yesterday, today, and forever (*Hebrews 13:8*). He is our anchor when life feels unsteady (*Hebrews 6:19–20*), our hope when we grow tired (*Hebrews 12:12–13*), and our perfect High Priest who understands our weaknesses (*Hebrews 4:15*). The call of Hebrews is simple and powerful—hold fast to your faith, because He who promised is faithful (*Hebrews 10:23*).

When we fix our eyes on Jesus, we see the beauty of His forever love and the certainty of His finished work on the cross (*Hebrews 9:12; 12:2*). He has done what no one else could do—He has made a way for us to be forgiven (*Hebrews 10:14–18*), to belong to God (*Hebrews 8:10–12*), and to live with Him forever (*Hebrews 13:20–21*). The gospel isn't just

about what Jesus did long ago; it's about what He continues to do right now. He saves completely (*Hebrews 7:25*), prays continually (*Hebrews 9:24*), and reigns eternally (*Hebrews 1:8*). He is faithful and forever—and because of Him, so is our hope (*Hebrews 10:23; 13:8*).

LOCATE THE SCRIPTURE & TELL THE STORY



TELL THE STORY - HEBREWS

The book of Hebrews teaches us that Jesus will always be faithful and forever! He never changes, never gives up, and never stops caring for His people (*Hebrews 4:14–16; 7:25*). We don't know exactly who wrote the book, but we know that it was written to people who believed in Jesus and were having a hard time. Some of them were scared or tired from being treated badly because of their faith (*Hebrews 10:32–34*). The writer wanted to remind them that following Jesus was worth it and to keep their eyes on Him (*Hebrews 12:1–3*).

The letter explains that Jesus is better than anything or anyone else. He is a better messenger than the angels because He doesn't just bring a message from God—He is God's message to us (*Hebrews 1:1–2, 1:4*). He's a better leader than Moses because He doesn't just lead people out of a place; He saves us from sin (*Hebrews 3:1–6; 2:14–15*). And He's the best priest ever because He offered Himself as the perfect sacrifice for our sins, once and for all (*Hebrews 9:11–12; 10:10–12*). Now Jesus lives forever in heaven, talking to God for us and helping us when we need it (*Hebrews 4:14–16; 7:25*).

The book of Hebrews tells us that Jesus is everything God promised and more (*Hebrews 8:6; 10:1*). He keeps every promise and never fails (*Hebrews 10:23*). Because Jesus lives forever, the hope we have in Him will never end (*Hebrews 7:24–25; 13:8*). Even when life is hard or scary, Jesus is still on His throne (*Hebrews 1:3*), still faithful to His word (*Hebrews 10:36*), and still worth following (*Hebrews 12:1–3*).

We can count on Jesus no matter what happens. He's our anchor when life feels shaky (*Hebrews 6:19–20*), our helper when we're tired (*Hebrews 12:12–13*), and our friend who understands everything we go through (*Hebrews 4:15*). The book of Hebrews reminds us to hold tightly to our faith, because the One who made promises to us is faithful (*Hebrews 10:23*).

When we look to Jesus, we see His amazing love and what He did for us on the cross (*Hebrews 9:12; 12:2*). He made a way for us to be forgiven (*Hebrews 10:14–18*), to belong to God (*Hebrews 8:10–12*), and to live with Him forever (*Hebrews 13:20–21*). The good news, or the gospel, isn't just about what Jesus did a long time ago—it's about what He's still doing for us today! He saves us completely (*Hebrews 7:25*), prays for us always (*Hebrews 9:24*), and will reign forever as King (*Hebrews 1:8*). Jesus is faithful and forever—and because of Him, our hope will last forever too (*Hebrews 10:23; 13:8*).



RETELL THE STORY

Put events in order, draw a comic strip, build it with blocks or playdough, act it out, etc.



SHARE THE GOSPEL

The book of Hebrews shows us the incredible good news of the gospel—that Jesus is our great High Priest who made the way for us to come to God. In the Old Testament, priests offered sacrifices again and again for the people’s sins, but those sacrifices could never completely take away sin. Then Jesus came. He offered Himself as the perfect and final sacrifice, once for all, to bring us forgiveness (*Hebrews 9:12; 10:10*). Because of what Jesus did on the cross, we don’t have to be afraid to come to God. The barrier of sin has been broken. Now, through Jesus, we can come boldly to God’s throne and find mercy and grace whenever we need help (*Hebrews 4:14–16*). He stands between us and God as our Mediator, the bridge that connects a holy God to sinful people. The gospel message in Hebrews is this: Jesus has done everything needed to bring us to God—forever.

QUESTIONS TO REBUILD THE STORY

1. Who is the book of Hebrews really about? (*Hebrews 1:1–3*)

→ It’s all about Jesus, God’s final and greatest message to the world.

2. What does the book of Hebrews call Jesus in Hebrews 4:14? (*Hebrews 4:14*)

→ He is our great High Priest, the one who connects us to God.

3. What does a High Priest do? (*Hebrews 5:1*)

→ A priest stands between the people and God to offer sacrifices for sin.

4. Why did Jesus not need to offer animal sacrifices like other priests?

(*Hebrews 9:11–12; 10:10–12*)

→ Because He offered Himself as the perfect sacrifice once for all time.

5. What happens because Jesus died and rose again for us? (*Hebrews 9:15; 10:14*)

→ Our sins are forgiven, and we can belong to God forever.

6. How does Hebrews say we should come before God now? (*Hebrews 4:16*)

→ We can come boldly before His throne to find mercy and grace.

7. Why can we trust Jesus to help us when we struggle? (*Hebrews 2:17–18; 4:15*)

→ Because He understands what it's like to be tempted and can help us.

8. What does Hebrews 10:23 tell us to do because Jesus is faithful? (*Hebrews 10:23*)

→ We should hold fast to our faith and never give up, because He keeps His promises.

9. When are times you need to remember that Jesus understands how you feel?

(*Hebrews 4:15*)

10. How can you come to Jesus for help this week when you're struggling or afraid?

(*Hebrews 4:16*)

11. What are some ways you can "hold fast" to your faith and trust Jesus every day?

(*Hebrews 10:23*)

12. How does knowing that Jesus is faithful and forever give you hope? (*Hebrews 13:8*)

13. What does this story teach me about God or the gospel?

14. What does the story teach me about myself?

15. Are there any commands in this story to obey? How are they for God's glory and my good?

16. Are there any promises in this story to remember? How do they help me trust and love God?

17. How does this story help me live on mission?

PRAYER PROMPTS

Jesus, thank You for being our faithful High Priest who gave Your life to forgive our sins. Thank You that we can come to God without fear because You made the way for us. Help us to trust You, hold fast to our faith, and remember that You will always be faithful and forever.

IF TIME ALLOWS:

Practice naming the 4 Gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. Remind the kids that these books are in the NT and tell of Jesus' time on earth. Practice finding these books in the Bible.

REVIEW UNIT VERSE:

Continue to use the Memory Verse Handout for fun ideas for practicing the memory verse for this unit.

ATTRIBUTES OF GOD

ATTENTIVE - God hears and responds to the needs of His children.

COMPASSIONATE - God cares for His children and acts on their behalf.

CREATOR - God made everything. He is uncreated.

DELIVERER - God rescues and saves His children.

ETERNAL - God is not limited by time; He exists outside of time.

FAITHFUL - God always keeps His promises.

GENEROUS - God gives what is best and beyond what is deserved.

GLORIOUS - God displays His greatness and worth.

GOOD - God is what is best and gives what is best. He is incapable of doing harm.

HOLY - God is perfect, pure, and without sin.

IMMUTABLE/UNCHANGING - God never changes. He is the same yesterday, today, and tomorrow.

INCOMPREHENSIBLE - God is beyond our understanding. We can comprehend Him in part but not in whole.

INFINITE - God has not limits in His person or on His power.

JEALOUS - God will not share His glory with another. All glory rightfully belongs to Him.

JUST - God is fair in all His actions and judgements. He cannot over-punish or under-punish.

LOVING - God feels and displays infinite, unconditional affection toward His children. His love for them does not depend on their worth, response, or merit.

MERCIFUL - God does not give His children the punishment they deserve.

OMNIPOTENT/ALMIGHTY - God holds all power. Nothing is too hard for God. What He wills He can accomplish.

OMNIPRESENT - God is fully present everywhere.

OMNISCIENT - God knows everything, past, present, and future - all potential and real outcomes, all things micro and macro.

ATTRIBUTES OF GOD

PATIENT/LONG-SUFFERING - God is untiring and bears with His children.

PROVIDER - God meets the needs of His children.

REFUGE - God is a place of safety and protection for His children.

RIGHTEOUS - God is always good and right.

SELF-EXISTENT - God depends on nothing and no one to give Him life or existence.

SELF-SUFFICIENT - God is not vulnerable. He has no needs.

SOVEREIGN - God does everything according to His plan and pleasure. He controls all things.

TRANSCENDENT - God is not like humans. He is infinitely higher in being and action.

TRUTHFUL - Whatever God speaks or does is truth and reality.

WISE - God knows what is best and acts accordingly. He cannot choose wrongly.

WORTHY - God deserves all glory and honor and praise.

WRATHFUL - God hates all unrighteousness.
