BACKGROUND INFO FOR LEADERS

About four centuries after the last OT book was written, the long-awaited Messiah was born. Prophets had foretold many details about his life and ministry, so Israel had expectations for a deliverer. No one knew exactly what kind of Messiah to expect or specifically when He would come.

The book of Matthew begins with the genealogy of Jesus Christ. The word "genealogy" is the Greek word "genesis" which means "beginning", "origin", or "birth". The book of Genesis has this title because it is a book of beginnings, an introduction of newness. The birth of Jesus represents a new beginning with the arrival of the Messiah, the rescuer the world has been waiting for.

A new era in Israel's history begins with the story of Jesus' conception. God sends the angel Gabriel to Nazareth, a town in Galilee, to a young virgin named Mary. Mary was pledged to be married to a man named Joseph. The custom of betrothal was different from "engagement" in modern society. Customarily the parents of a young man chose a young woman to be engaged to their son. A second stage of betrothal involved official arrangements and a prenuptial agreement before witnesses, which was a legally binding contract and could be broken only by a formal process of divorce. Betrothed partners were referred to as husband and wife though they were not yet considered married. Sexual unfaithfulness during betrothal was considered adultery, and under the Mosaic law carried the death penalty by stoning.

Mary was living in a small town far removed from the center of religious life in Jerusalem and was about four months pregnant, having spent three months with Elizabeth, her "relative" (Luke 1:36, 56).

Gabriel, the angel of the Lord, greets Mary by telling her she is "highly favored" by the Lord and that the Lord is with her. This troubles Mary and she doesn't understand. The angel tells her not to be afraid and again repeats she has found favor with God. He tells her she will have a child and that she is to name him Jesus. Mary learns that her son will be no ordinary child. She is instructed to name Him "Jesus". His name reflects His mission to rescue people from sin. Jesus, she is told, will be "great" and will be called "the Son of the Most High God," indicating that He is God's chosen Messiah and His kingdom will never end".

BACKGROUND INFO FOR LEADERS

Mary wonders how this can be because she is a virgin. Gabriel tells her that the Holy Spirit will overshadow her and will perform this great miracle of pregnancy in a virgin. This is a miraculous beginning ordained by God's power alone. Jesus' holiness derives from His being conceived by the Holy Spirit. Though Jesus was a genuine human, He did not inherit a sinful nature and disposition from Adam, as all other human beings do.

Mary tries to absorb the shock that her baby will be the Savior, Son, and King. Mary's response to this startling news was nothing short of amazing: "I am the Lord's servant," she tells the angel. "May your word to me be fulfilled" (Luke 1:38).

In Luke 1:46-56, Mary sings a song of praise and thanksgiving to the Lord ("the Magnificat"). Mary's entire being is caught up in praise to God. Mary's song speaks of what her son's birth means for believing Israelites.


In the first-century world of Palestine, honor and shame were extremely important community values. Honor was all about respect and peer approval. Shame, by contrast, was the removal of such respect and the disapproval of peers due to some action looked down upon in the society. People were motivated to attain honor and to avoid shame. Joseph and Mary faced a huge social dilemma since pregnancy prior to marriage was a shameful situation. Joseph must balance his love for Mary with the necessity of upholding his honor and reputation as a righteous man. God intervenes through a dream and tells him to accept Mary as his wife.

When Joseph, Mary's future husband, finds out Mary is pregnant, he plans to quietly send her away. Joseph intends to maintain his personal righteousness, yet he desires to show compassion even though Mary appears to be an adulteress. The angel of the Lord, Gabriel, speaks to Joseph in a dream and explains that the baby was conceived by the Holy Spirit. "She will give birth to a son," the angel said, "and you are to give him the name of Jesus, because He will save His people from their sins." This fulfilled Isaiah's prophecy that a virgin would give birth to a child, and His name would be Immanuel, or "God with us." Joseph was familiar with the Scriptures and knew of the prophecy, so when he woke up, he immediately did what the angel said and took Mary as his wife.

The name Jesus means "Yahweh saves". Salvation from sins was a repeated promise in OT prophesy (Isaiah 40:2, 53:6, Jer. 31:31-34, Ezek. 36:25-27, Dan. 9:24, Zech. 13:1).

The prophecy in Matthew 1:23 is from Isaiah 7:14. The name "Jesus" specifies what God does "God saves", while the messianic title "Immanuel" specifies who He is, "God with us".

LOCATE THE SCRIPTURE & TELL THE STORY



TELL THE STORY

Read directly from Scripture, use the message, or the summary provided in the lesson Locate the scripture in the Bible: Matthew 1:18-25, Luke 1:26-38, and Luke 1: 46-56

Tell the story: Use the background info for leaders to help tell the story.

Re-tell the Bible Story: Have students re-tell the story as best they can.

Attributes of God: Determine the characteristics of God that we see in today's story. How can knowing these characteristics of God to be true, change the way we live in Christ?

Share the GOSPEL: According to Luke 2:10-11, the announcement of the birth of Jesus was the beginning of the Good News that will bring great joy to all people! The promised Messiah, Yahweh or "Jesus Saves" was finally almost here!



Put the events in order, draw a comic strip, build it with blocks or playdough, act it out, etc...

"Storying" Questions: As you ask these questions, have your students find the answers in the actual verses of scripture instead of recalling them from your re-telling of the story. We always want to encourage all of our students to go directly to God's Word over a commentary on or summary of scripture. Use the Bible Study Bookmark Questions as well as these questions to help students understand the text:

- 1. Who was Mary? Describe what was going on in her life.
- 2. Who came to Mary and told her what God was going to do?
- 3. How do you think Mary felt when she saw this messenger?
- 4. What are some of the things the angel told Mary?
- 5. How did Mary respond?
- 6. What made Jesus special and different from other people? Who was His true father?
- 7. How did Joseph feel about what Mary told him?
- 8. Who came to Joseph and told him about God's great plans?
- 9. How did Joseph respond?
- 10. What does the name Immanuel mean?
- 11. What is the Good News?
- 12. How does the Good News give us great joy?

ATTRIBUTES OF GOD

- ATTENTIVE God hears and responds to the needs of his children.
- **COMPASSIONATE God cares for his children and acts on their behalf.**
- **CREATOR God made everything. He is uncreated.**
- **DELIVERER** God rescues and saves his children.
- ETERNAL God is not limited by time. He exists outside of time.
- FAITHFUL God always keeps his promises.
- **GENEROUS** God gives what is best and beyond what is deserved.
- GLORIOUS God displays His greatness and worth.
- GOOD God is what is best and gives what is best. He is incapable of doing harm.
- HOLY God is perfect, pure, and without sin.
- IMMUTABLE/UNCHANGING God never changes. He is the same yesterday, today, and tomorrow.
- INCOMPREHENSIBLE God is beyond our understanding. We can comprehend Him in part but not in whole.
- **INFINITE** God has not limits in His person or on His power.
- JEALOUS God will not share his glory with another. all glory rightfully belongs to him.
- JUST god is fair in all his actions and judgements. He cannot over-punish or under-punish.
- LOVING God feels and displays infinite, unconditional affection toward his children. His love for them does not depend on their worth, response, or merit.
- **MERCIFUL** God does not give his children the punishment they deserve.
- OMNIPOTENT/ALMIGHTY God holds all power. nothing is too hard for God. What He wills He can accomplish.

ATTRIBUTES OF GOD

OMNIPRESENT - God is fully present everywhere.

- OMNISCIENT God knows everything, past, present, and future all potential and real outcomes, all things micro and macro.
- PATIENT/LONG-SUFFERING God is untiring and bears with His children.
- **PROVIDER** God meets the needs of his children.
- **REFUGE God is a place of safety and protection for his children.**
- **RIGHTEOUS God is always good and right.**
- **SELF-EXISTENT** God depends on nothing and no one to give him life or existence.
- **SELF-SUFFICIENT** God is not vulnerable. He has no needs.
- SOVEREIGN God does everything according to HIs plan and pleasure.
- **TRANSCENDENT** God is not like humans. He is infinitely higher in being and action.
- **TRUTHFUL** Whatever God speaks or does is truth and reality.
- WISE God knows what is best and acts accordingly. He cannot choose wrongly.
- WORTHY God deserves all glory and honor and praise.
- WRATHFUL God hates all unrighteousness.

Thank you for being a God who is the King who will reign forever while also coming to earth as a human in the humblest way.
